Vocational Nursing: The program is a clinical intensive one-year certificate program that offers classroom instruction and related clinical practice in four basic areas of nursing: fundamentals, medical/surgical, maternity/pediatric, and psychiatric.

Licenses Practical Nurse – L.P.N. or Vocational Nurse – L.V.N.

Licensed practical and licensed vocational nurses work in many settings providing basic nursing care in the local community. Most work full time in the following areas: acute care and long-term care facilities, home health, dialysis clinics, plasma centers, correctional facilities, community health clinics/physician's offices and school districts.

As of April 18, 2025, the average annual salary for Licensed Practical Nurses (LPNs) and Licensed Vocational Nurses (LVNs) in the United States is \$62,340, according to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics.

In Texas, as of May 1, 2025, the average salary for LVNs is \$54,166 per year, with typical earnings ranging from \$49,155 to \$60,204, according to <u>Salary.com</u>. Associate Degree Nursing Program - Transition Track

The Laredo College Associate Degree Program believes in the upward mobility of persons with previously acquired health care knowledge.

The Transition Track is a means of upward mobility. The ADN Transition Track can be completed in three semesters leading to an Associate in Applied Science degree. The program is accredited by the Accreditation Commission for Education in Nursing (ACEN) and approved by the Texas Board of Nurse Examiners (BON). Upon completion of the program, graduates are eligible to take the National Council Licensure Examination for Registered Nurses (NCLEX-RN).
