

## Certification and Licensure Information

Upon completion of the Associate Nursing Program the student may register for the NCLEX-RN licensure examination to become a Registered Nurse. The same exam is taken for the A.D.N. and B.S.N. traditional Nursing Programs nationwide.

#### **Regional Labor Market Information**

The national average salary of a registered nurse as of 2019 is at \$75,510 per year, representing an hourly wage of \$36.30. The data is according to the estimates released by the United States Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) Occupational Outlook Handbook in March 2019.

## **Transfer Information**

### ADN-RN to BSN Program

As noted, there continues to be a nursing shortage throughout the United States. In addition, there is a movement for nurses to continue their education and obtain a BSN.

The associate degree education remains a pathway to the nursing profession with the continued emphasis to meet the recommendation from the Institute of Medicine's (IOM) 80% baccalaureate prepared workforce by 2020.

The BSN is the stepping stone to an advanced degree which is needed to teach in registered nurse programs. Only 16.2% of initially ADN trained RNs eventually earned a BSN, 5.8% completed a Master of Science in Nursing, and 0.3% completed a doctoral degree in nursing (TCNWS, 2015). However, 15.6% of initially BSN educated RNs eventually obtained a master's and about 1.1% achieved a doctorate degree (TCNWS, 2015).
