








Higher Education Evolution: Retention to Post-Graduate Success





 - October 18, 2022 Commission presented updated draft and unanimously approved the recommendations
 - November 17, 2022 Final report published and made public

Key Components of House Bill 8



Financial Aid for Swift Transfer (FAST)

A new financial aid program that would allow "educationally disadvantaged" students to enroll in dual credit classes at no cost to them.

Shared Services

Encourages public junior colleges to participate in institutional collaborations that help students afford college, complete credentials, and transfer.

Performance Tier

The funding level that constitutes the majority of state funding and is comprised of measurable outcomes.


Base Tier

The funding level that ensures each public junior college has access to a defined level of funding for instruction and operations.

Community College Standing Advisory Committee (SAC)

A group of community college leaders that will provide advice and counsel to the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board during implementation.

SUPPLEMENTAL APPROPRIATIONS

Advocate for a supplemental appropriations request for the current biennium, fully supporting the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board's final recommendation.



FORMULA FUNDING

Support the formula funding recommendation made by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board for public junior colleges for the next biennium.



PRIVATE INSTITUTIONS IN PERFORMANCE TIER

Amend the State Funding Performance Tier of House Bill 8 to include students who transfer to one of Texas' private or independent institutions of higher education after completing 15 semester credit hours at a public junior college.
