First graduating class of Organizational Leadership degree makes history at Laredo College

Laredo College reached a historic milestone in 2021 when our institution was approved by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board (THECB) to offer its second baccalaureate degree, a Bachelor of Applied Science in Organizational Leadership (BASORGL). LC joined an elite group of only three community colleges in Texas to be granted THECB approval to offer this degree.

Only a year later, the program's first student cohort will walk across the stage to receive their degrees after completing this rigorous academic program that will prepare them for leadership roles across numerous fields and industries.

This high-quality, affordable program allows students to complete an online degree in four years or less while also incurring no student loan debt. Students will also benefit from being able to transfer all undergraduate credits from academic or workforce programs into this program, which aids in the elimination of lost credits, time and money.

The program's mission is to develop leaders for Laredo and the surrounding regions. The degree focuses on practical workplace skills. Graduates are prepared to enter the workforce with careers in various industries including executive leadership, operations management, and human resources. This degree will also prepare students for careers in a wide range of fields, including health, homeland security, early childhood programs, and business.

This program is delivered utilizing Competency-Based Education (CBE), which is online instruction that allows students to work at their own pace to complete courses. This method can make a significant, positive impact on students who may shorten their completion of each course to just a few weeks, depending on a student's previous knowledge and skills.

Past, current and prospective LC students will find this program to be a seamless pathway from their current courses at LC, including dual enrollment courses, to earning their Bachelor's Degree in Organizational Leadership.

Laredo College is excited to provide this opportunity for students to earn an affordable, four-year degree that trains them for rewarding careers locally, regionally and nationally.

The Academic Costume

The procession, which begins most commencement ceremonies, is a colorful and symbolic event steeped in history and tradition. Dating from Medieval times, the procession sets the mood for this solemn yet joyous celebration of student accomplishment.

The procession consists of the faculty and the candidates for degrees. Candidates are dressed in caps and gowns of similar design. Academic costumes date from the Middle Ages when a warm gown and hood were useful for scholars and clerics in damp and unheated buildings. Until the Civil War, students in most American universities wore caps and gowns daily. These varied in design until they were standardized by the American Intercollegiate Commission in 1894 when it was decided that all robes would be black. Now many universities design their own distinctive academic garb.

Standard academic regalia for faculty includes colorful hoods and gowns, which signify both the degree they hold and the institution conferring it. The more advanced the degree, the more elaborate the gown. The color of the facing on the hood indicates the discipline of the degree earned.

Among these are: White - arts and letters, including journalism Green - medicine Dark blue - philosophy Yellow - science Brown - architecture and fine arts

Pink - music Orange - engineering Light brown - business Lemon yellow - library service Citron yellow - social work

Honors achieved by Laredo College students are acknowledged with the following additions to the academic costume.

Ceremonial Distinctions

- Magna Cum Laude two gold cords
- Cum Laude one gold cord
- Phi Theta Kappa Honor Society gold stole with the PTK letters on it and/or blue and gold honor cords
- LC Honors Program gold stole and medal

The Mace

The use of a mace during college graduation ceremonies combines symbolic communication with the principle of vested authority at the most traditional and sacred of academic celebrations. The Laredo College ceremonial mace is made of pine and symbolizes the history and traditions that have been established by the college. The mace adds meaning and dignity to the commencement ritual. It reminds both participants and spectators that education is one of the most cherished attributes of a free and democratic society.
