The recommendations may be adjusted reasonably based on the facts and circumstances of the case, the relative harm created, and the student’s demonstrated insight and readiness to change behavior. Conduct administrators should follow the sanctioning guidelines unless compelling extraordinary factors are present.

Prohibited Weapons and Devices Violations

Possession, distribution, sale, or use of firearms, location-restricted knives, clubs, knuckles, firearm silencers, or other prohibited weapons or devices in violation of law or College District policies and procedures shall be prohibited. [See CHF]

Debts

Owing a monetary debt to the College District that is considered delinquent or writing an "insufficient funds" check to the College District shall be prohibited.

Gambling or engaging in any other conduct that College District officials might reasonably believe will substantially disrupt the College District program or incite violence shall be prohibited.

Use of Electronic Devices Violation

The use of an electronic device shall not interfere with instructional, administrative, student, public service, and other authorized activities on College District premises. Certain violations of this policy may be excused in the case of emergencies or other extenuating circumstances provided that prior approval is obtained from the instructor or respective College District official.
